**One:** We pray to you to grant us the wisdom to be grateful for all causes and conditions on this day.


All: Oh great, compassionate God! Please help us increase our wisdom. Please help us open our minds.

Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children, and walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.

Leticia Del Toro is a Mexican-American poet and fiction writer from Crockett, California. Her travels to Mexico, Spain and France, also inform her work. *All We Are Told Not to Touch*, is her debut poetry release from Finishing Line Press. Her writings have appeared in Huizache, Zyzzyva, About Place Journal and more. Kore Press published her novella, *Café Colima* in 2018. Additional honors include residencies to Hedgebrook, Bread Loaf and Storyknife.

Leticia has also thrived in the writing communities of VONA and Macondo. She is a graduate of UC Berkeley and UC Davis. She was recently awarded a Jack Hazard Fellowship from the New Literary Project for high school teachers who are creative writers. Leticia is currently working on a novel called, *Return to Azucena*.



Karen Llagas's new chapbook, *All Of Us Are Cleaved*, is now out from Nomadic Press! Her first collection of poetry, *Archipelago Dust*, was published by Meritage Press in 2010. A recipient of the 2022 RHINO Founder's Prize, Filamore Tabios, Sr. Memorial Poetry Prize, an Elizabeth George Award and a Hedgebrook residency, her poems, translations, prose and reviews have also appeared in various journals and anthologies.

Born and raised in the Philippines, she has an MFA in Writing from Warren Wilson College and a BA from Ateneo de Manila. Karen lectures at UC Berkeley and works as a freelance translator & cultural consultant. She divides her time between San Francisco and Los Angeles with her husband and their two dogs, Boccia & Oso.
